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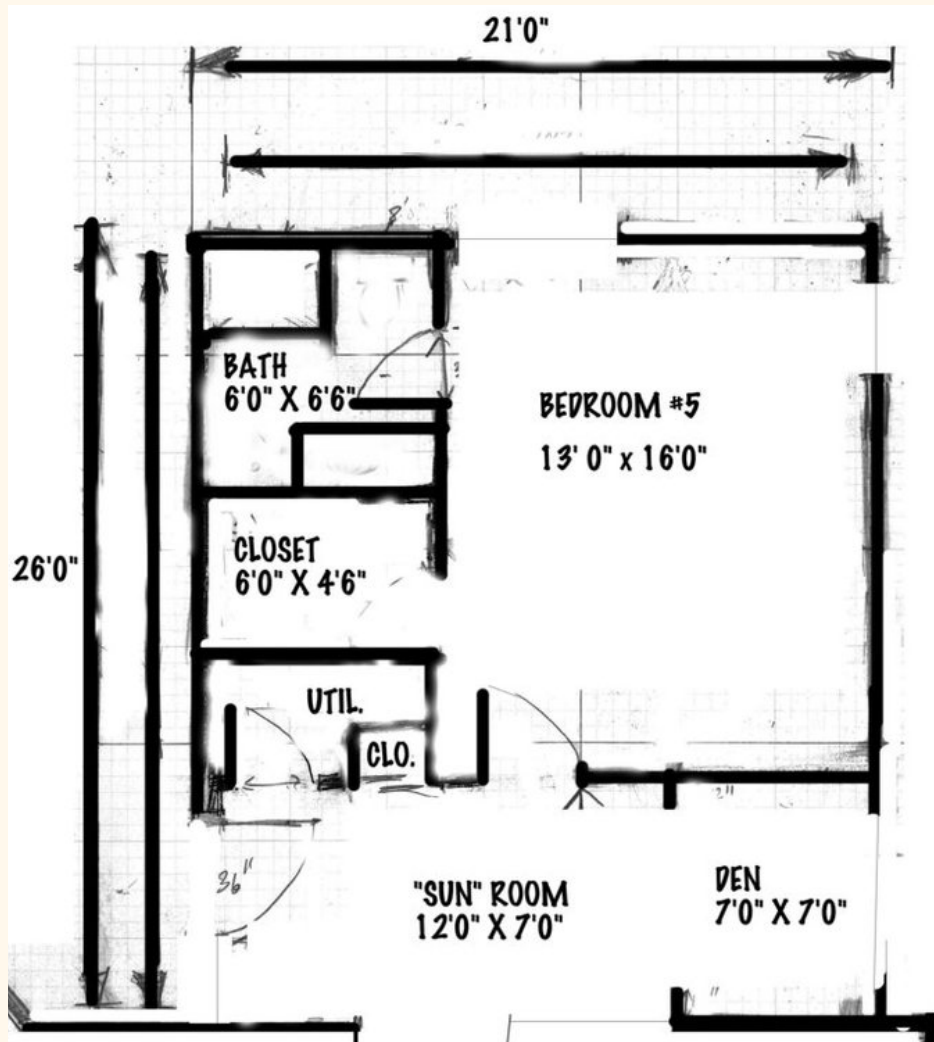
So what IS this Information Architecture (IA)?

- Good question.
 - Organizing and labeling a digital library properly is an excellent example. But just an example.
 - Proper organization respects system and users
- Better question: What ISN'T IA?
 - Actually, very few things.
 - Information is all around us and must be organized properly.
 - Libraries/etc. technically a form of IA

Why is IA so important for a website?

- Represents organization and relationships between pages
- Properly done IA = easy to use website
- Easy to use website = more customers, users, higher ratings, etc.
- Same reasons we properly organize and put signs in libraries

One basis of IA: Real architecture (Plan)



- RS Wurman, an archetypal IA practitioner, felt IA was an offshoot of civil architecture.*
- Draft on left designed by yours truly. Actually exists in structure; attached to his parents' house in Westfield, Indiana
- Considerations
 - System
 - Making use of environment
 - Follow civil building codes
 - Cultural/personal (user)
 - Meet typical American expectations of residential architecture
 - Meet customer (parents') specific expectations
 - External aesthetics (don't want angry neighbors)

One basis of IA: Real architecture (Product)

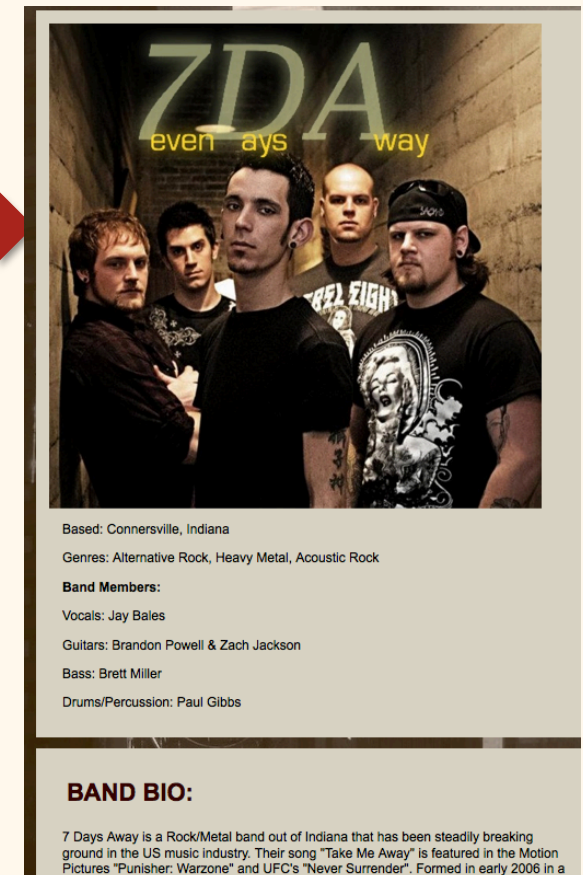
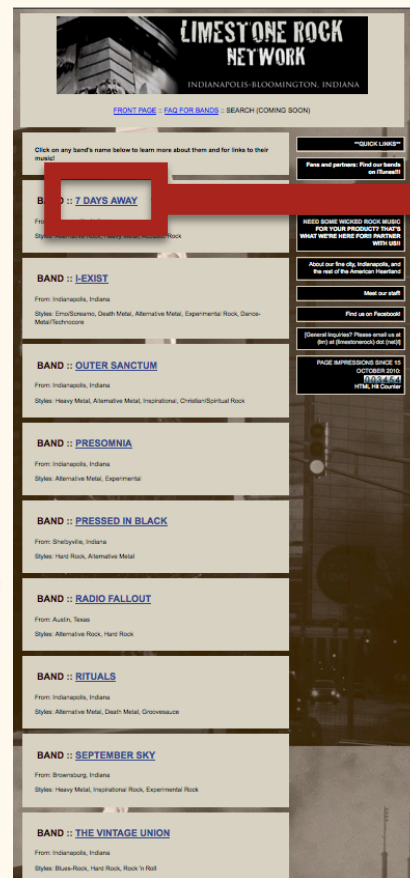
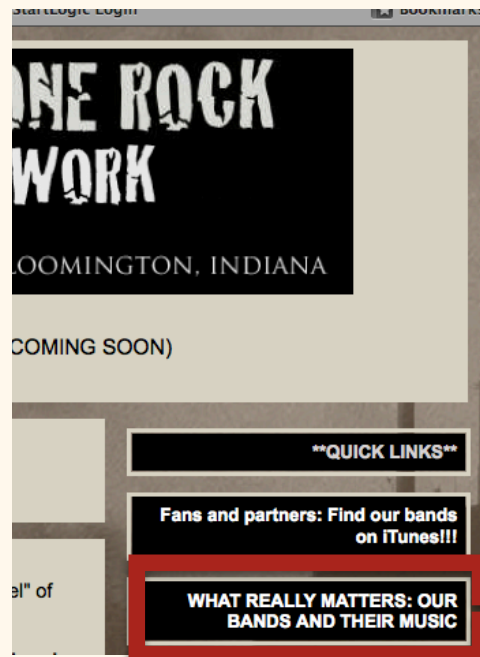
Of course, an architectural plan should ideally translate to a navigable product.



One basis of IA: Real architecture

- The actual extension required modifications prior to building.
- System considerations
 - No codes violated, fortunately.
 - Bathroom and closet switched to put bathroom next to water heater/utilities
 - Very large skylights in added to sunroom to actually have light in room
- Respect cultural norms and customer requirements
 - Overall depth shortened to minimize impact of exterior appearance (again, don't want angry neighbors!)
 - Den and sunroom merged at parents' request

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Beyond houses and bands: Signs

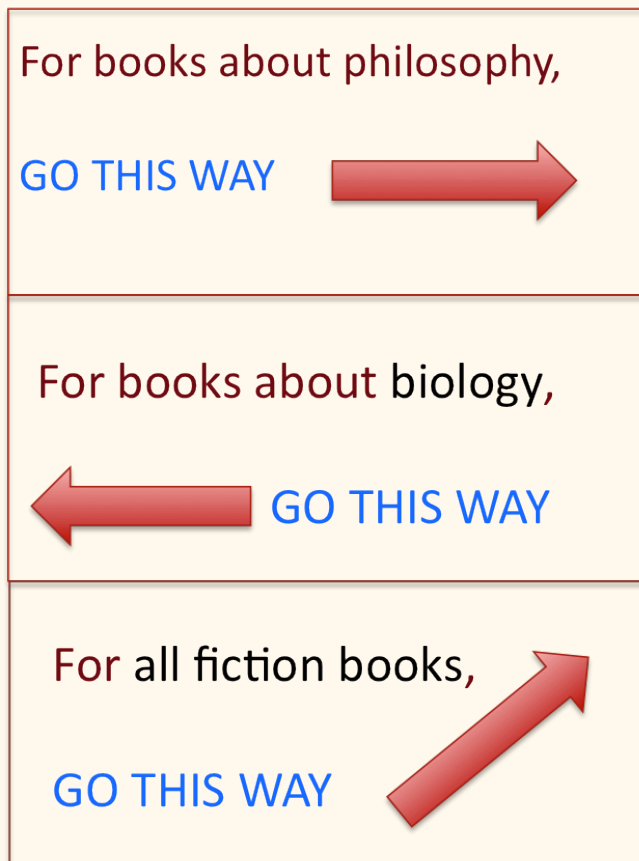
- Well-designed signs, labels, and directions are mandatory for proper execution of IA.
- Similar principles followed in physical libraries and museums.
 - Technically a form of IA in and of itself!

Proper signage: Digital

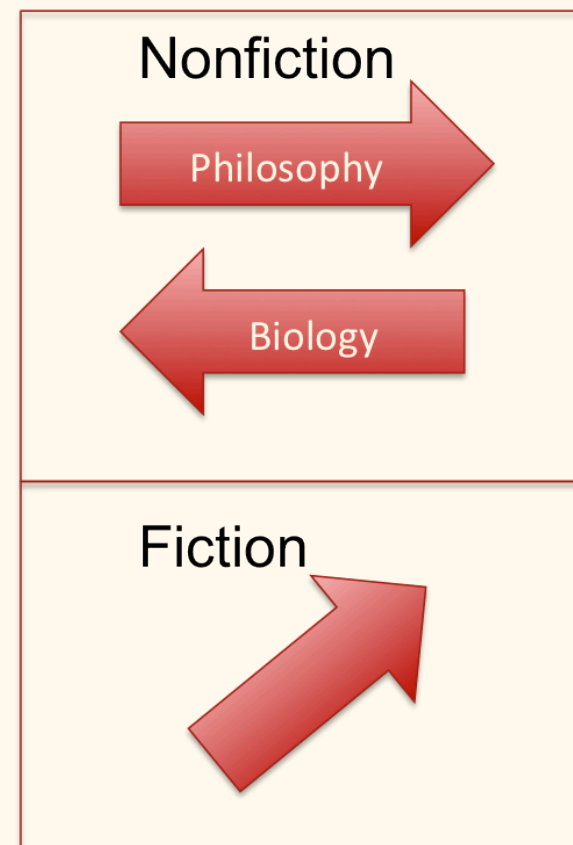
- Bad “digital” signage may include poorly designed:
 - Links on the web
 - Menus in computer software applications
- Overcoming this requires good IA practice.

Proper signage: A website

- Unsurprisingly, the same goes for web links.
 - “Click here” is the nemesis of many information architects
 - Verbal cues preferred instead

Proper signage: General

- Organize, organize, organize (when possible)
 - E.g. Nonfiction/fiction in library
 - On sites: Adding headers (e.g. “links”) to organize
 - Can get creative in complex sites/libraries/museums/etc.
 - Multiple organizational methods
- Good practice: Suggestive but descriptive cues
 - A library sign would never emphasize “go here”
 - Similarly, Webmasters don’t emphasize “click here”
 - Caveat: Make sure descriptive cues are extremely suggestive (can confuse readers otherwise!)

Other issues in IA

- Issues in design, signage, organization, building architecture, etc. often paralleled in digital IA.
- Complex organizational patterns
 - Faceted organization: Difficult in real-world spaces, easier on the web/with software.
- Cultural changes and differences
 - Are people getting used to “[click here](#)”?
 - Different types of organization for different countries/languages
 - German sites differ significantly from English ones.
